DORIS-TWITCHELL-ALLEN

Doris Twitchell-Allen, founder of The International Children's Summer Villages and best known as the creator of the "Crib Scene" technique, was a pioneer in the field of psychodrama for all of her professional life until her death in 2002 at the age of 100. Profiled in the Oct. 14-21, 2002 issue of the New Yorker magazine, the Summer Village program was founded in 1951 when Doris was a professor of psychology at the University of Cincinnati. The program featured action techniques, including role playing, to foster understanding among pre-teens from many countries. The "Crib Scene" technique was published in the Journal in 1960. Her enduring contributions to psychodrama and her loving, vital presence, - Gene Eliasoph will always remember how in her later years she danced a jig on a table, to show how young she felt - will always be an inspiration.
